THOUGHTS FROM FR. RICHARD

■ **EASTER IS AN “EVOLUTIONARY LEAP.” CATHOLIC LIFE IS AN EASTER LIFE**

Our parish community is most happy to have had all of you with us this Easter Sunday. Our hearts are warmed by your belief in the Resurrection of Jesus Christ. And we hope that your hearts are warmed as well! This unmistakable experience of the first Apostles and disciples of Jesus, recorded in the Gospels, was so real, so different and so life-changing that such good news has been passed down from one generation to the next for centuries.

The challenge for us who live 2000 years later is to feel something of what was felt then. It is a long way from today to back then. What can we bring to today? A simple faith that it must be so? A desire to believe and to hold onto this ancient faith experience? Our intuition about the presence of spring in the cycles of life? A gift of faith that we received from God and from our parents? A great longing for spiritual freedom that only a Risen Jesus can fill? Something happened after the death of Jesus.

In his book, “Jesus of Nazareth,” Holy Week: From the Entrance into Jerusalem to the Resurrection, Pope Benedict writes about Jesus “breaking into an entirely new form of life, into a life that is no longer subject to the law of dying and becoming, but lies beyond it--- a life that opens up a new dimension of human existence.” It constitutes what Pope Benedict calls an “evolutionary leap”... a new possibility of human existence that affects everyone and opens up a new future, a kind of a new future for mankind.

Pope Benedict writes very beautifully about Jesus: “He has entered upon a different life, a new life---he has entered the vast breadth of God himself, and it is from there that he reveals himself to his followers.” (page 244)

The dead body that I will become disintegrates into dust and will not return from dust. The resurrection is a becoming someone and something completely new

and different. Is it not who we were once? There is nothing in our human experience that even approximates what will happen and what we will become. That is why it is so difficult to put into words or to describe. How would we be able to describe something that we have not experienced?

All we can do is to say “Really?” “Wow! Bring it on!”

I don’t think that many Catholic think very much about the Resurrection of Jesus or of our own resurrection because we’re very busy experiencing and working through life. Thank God that we just sort of take it for granted as a doctrine of Our Faith without much question. It is certainly an excellent alternative to nothing. But if we do wonder about it from time to time and try to imagine what it means, I think that Pope Benedict gives us something to think about and to desire.

The Resurrection is not a static moment in time, but an evolutionary, progressing moment of a life force that is indestructible, morphing through the centuries, inviting everyone to claim their destiny. Once this beautiful life on this planet is over, we are being assumed into the final expression for all life, “a dwelling not made by hands,” St. Paul described it, eternal in heaven.” (2 Cor: 5:1)

Lastly, I share a thought from Pope Francis in his Encyclical letter, “Laudato Si,” On the Care for Our Common Home:” Each creature reflects something of God and has a message to convey to us, and the security that Christ has taken unto himself this material world and now, risen, is intimately present to each being, surrounding it with his affection and penetrating it with his light.” (para. 221) That is a wonderful description of our personal resurrection and how we experience the Jesus Risen in our own lives. We are so joined together that we may not realize that we are already living a risen life. St. John captured the great mystery well when he wrote:

“See what love the Father has bestowed upon us that we may be called the children of God. Yet so we are. What we shall be has not yet been revealed. We know that

when it is revealed , we shall be like him, for we shall see him as he is. (1John 3:1-2)

We do not mark or celebrate a day. We are celebrating a way of life. And we are going to continue to celebrate that for the next 50 days, by reading some of the experiences of the risen Jesus as early church members encountered him. They are always something more than the story itself.

So, why don’t you come back for at least the next seven weekends and see what happens? The Catholic Christian life is meant to be an Easter Life.

Mercy Me! Questions for the Church in the Year of Mercy

There is a lot of talk about Mercy this year, but how does it apply to my everyday life? How do I continue practicing Mercy after the year is over? What are some of the issues that may be keeping me away from church? What does the church say about things like sin, remarriage, or being LGBT? Join us for a new series **starting April 5** on Tuesday nights (7:00-9:00pm) in Classroom B1. Come to all the sessions or just those that appeal to you. The first will be: “I’m Still Mad at the Church Years Later.” How do we forgive the church for failing us? Fr. Richard Mangini will be leading the discussion.

Other sessions are:

April 26: “Is it a Sin if I Don’t Feel Guilty?” Dr. Lisa Fullam from the Jesuit School at the GTU will come to talk about sin and the development of moral conscience.

May 17: “Are All Welcome or Not: Maybe Yes, Maybe No” Addressing LGBT issues in the church today. Fr. Jim Schexnayder will join us to share his experiences ministering to the LGBT community in the Oakland Diocese.

May 31: “Grill the Canon Lawyer” Fr. Bob McCann, Canon Lawyer for the Diocese of Oakland and Professor at St. Patrick’s Seminary, will join us to talk about divorce, annulment and remarriage.

■ **WITH MERCY WE ACT FOR JUSTICE**

Next weekend some of our parishioners will be outside the Church collecting signatures to a ballot measure raising minimum wage legislation to \$15.00 per hour by 2020 and bringing the number of sick days to six. I invite you to consider participating in this action, since it aligns with your Catholic Social Teachings.

A couple of years ago, Bishop Blaire, who heads the U.S. Bishops' Committee on Domestic Justice and Human Development, made a strong case for protecting the rights and dignity of workers, calling on the teachings of several Popes, including Leo XIII, John Paul II, Benedict XVI, and of course Pope Francis. In his testimony, Blaire argued that a just wage—one that realistically allows a worker to support their family based on the current cost of living—is critical for workers and would be a positive first step in fixing the economy. "Work should be a ladder out of poverty for families, it should not trap them in poverty," said Blaire. "Yet this is where we find ourselves—a growing number of families are working but do not make enough to live in dignity. It is a scandal that the richest country in the world has allowed over 23 million children from poor, working families to become the norm."

On the 50th anniversary of the war on poverty, Archbishop Thomas G. Wenski, chairman of the Committee on Domestic Justice and Human Development on behalf of the USCCB, and Father Larry Snyder, president of Catholic Charities USA, sent a letter to the U.S. Senate asking the federal government to raise the minimum wage. The stated goal of raising the minimum wage of Archbishop Wenski and Fr. Snyder is to "fix" the problem that "a full-year, full-time worker making the minimum wage does not make enough money to raise a child free from poverty." (NCR)

On the Condition of Workers (Rerum Novarum) Pope Leo XIII, 1891 wrote, "Equity therefore commands that public authority show proper concern for the worker so that from what he contributes to the common good he may receive what will enable him, housed, clothed, and

secure, to live his life without hardship. Whence, it follows that all those measures ought to be favored which seem in any way capable of benefiting the condition of workers" (No. 51).

Opponents have always argued that wage levels should be left to the market. In 1961, in the encyclical *Mater et Magistra*, Pope John XXIII responded to that claim and proclaimed that a living wage was clearly a justice issue: "We therefore consider it our duty to reaffirm that the remuneration of work is not something that can be left to the laws of the marketplace; nor should it be a decision left to the will of the more powerful. It must be determined in accordance with justice and equity; which means that workers must be paid a wage which allows them to live a truly human life and to fulfill their family obligations in a worthy manner." Pope John Paul II went further. In *On Human Work* (1981) he wrote that payment of living wages was a critical criterion for determining the legitimacy of the entire economic system. In their 1986 letter, *Economic Justice for All*, the U.S. Catholic bishops reaffirmed that payment of just wages is the initial step in combating poverty and put the issue squarely on the social justice agenda for the American economy. The focus should remain on the plight of low-income workers struggling to support their families and live in dignity. As popes and bishops have said "the worker does not exist for the economy. The economy exists for the worker." (Mulloy, the economics and labor adviser for the USCCB)

March 27, 2016, Easter Sunday:
The Resurrection of the Lord



This is the day the Lord has made; let us rejoice and be glad. Alleluia! Easter is always, but especially in this *Jubilee Year of Mercy*, the victory of God's gentle but invincible mercy

raising up Jesus, "faithful witness, the first-born of the dead" (Revelation 1:5), "first-born among many brothers [and sisters]" (Romans 8:29), conquering death in all its forms, in all of us in the human family. In Luke's Vigil Gospel, heavenly messengers send the women forth: "Remember what [Jesus] said to you" (Luke 24:6). In John's Gospel, the empty tomb likewise "sends forth" Mary Magdalene, Peter, and the Beloved Disciple, who believe though they do not fully understand. Finally, Luke's evening "Emmaus" Gospel sends *us* forth, as "missionaries of mercy," assuring us that we will encounter the Risen Lord, today and every day, in "the stranger" we meet along life's journey, in "the Word that makes our hearts burn within us," and "in the breaking of bread" (see Luke 24:32, 35).

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■ JUAN 20, 1-9

El primer día después del sábado, estando todavía oscuro, fue María Magdalena al sepulcro y vio removida la piedra que lo cerraba. Echó a correr, llegó a la casa donde estaban Simón Pedro y el otro discípulo, a quien Jesús amaba, y les dijo: “Se han llevado del sepulcro al Señor y no sabemos dónde lo habrán puesto”.

Salieron Pedro y el otro discípulo camino del sepulcro. Los dos iban corriendo juntos, pero el otro discípulo corrió más aprisa que Pedro y llegó primero al sepulcro, e inclinándose, miró los lienzos puestos en el suelo, pero no entró.

En eso llegó también Simón Pedro, que lo venía siguiendo, y entró en el sepulcro. Contempló los lienzos puestos en el suelo y el sudario, que había estado sobre la cabeza de Jesús, puesto no con lienzos en el suelo, sino doblado en sitio aparte.

Entonces entró también el otro discípulo, el que había llegado primero al sepulcro, y vio y creyó, porque hasta entonces no habían entendido las Escrituras, según las cuales Jesús debía resucitar de entre los muertos.

Lo mataron colgándolo de la cruz, pero Dios **lo Resucitó** al tercer día y concedió verlo, no a todo el pueblo, sino únicamente a los testigos **que él**, de antemano, había escogido.

“Cristo ha resucitado”, esto lo afirman los testigos sus apóstoles, que comieron y bebieron con él después de su muerte, porque Cristo resucitó. Hoy en este Domingo de Pascua de igual manera, como la Iglesia primitiva, cristiana naciente celebró este esplendor, de luz y de amor de Dios, también nosotros hoy celebramos grandemente con nuestros corazones ardientes de alegría, reconociendo que en verdad ha resucitado.

Nosotros como cristianos católicos debemos experimentar una conversión en nuestra persona, **para fortalecernos**, para que así vayamos asimilando progresivamente la verdad de que Cristo ha resucitado y vive con la Iglesia en el Espíritu Santo, y seremos capaces de irnos desprendiendo de diferentes y viejas formas de pensar y de actuar y animar a los demás a que también ellos adopten un nuevo estilo de vida.

Los apóstoles son testigos no sólo de la muerte y resurrección de Jesús, sino también de toda su actividad milagrosa, que es el signo de la llegada del reino, en el que los gentiles, los pecadores son también invitados a entrar por la fe en Jesús y por el perdón de sus pecados en su nombre.

Por eso Pablo les dice en su carta a los Colosenses 3:1-4: “Hermanos: puesto que ustedes han resucitado con Cristo, busquen los bienes de arriba, donde está Cristo, sentado a la derecha de Dios. Pongan todo el corazón en los bienes del cielo, no en los de la tierra”.

Pablo hoy nos motiva en esta exhortación a dar muerte al hombre viejo y a sus motivaciones, a vivir la resurrección de Cristo y prolongación en la vida familiar, caminemos bien “caminar” es vivir. Revistámonos de sentimiento de misericordia, esto es resucitar.

Jesús al resucitar ha completado de una vez y para siempre la obra que el Padre le encomendó realizar. Una vez consumada, esta obra de salvación permanece completa.

Jesús muere, y de ese modo, entrega el Espíritu a los creyentes. La sangre y el agua que fluyeron de su costado traspasado, significan, según la interpretación tradicional, los dos grandes sacramentos de iniciación, **el bautismo y la Eucaristía**, con los que Cristo, a través de la Iglesia, **continúa dando luz** a los creyentes y alimentándolos con su propio cuerpo y sangre, para que vivamos una vida resucitada junto a él. Dios les ayude. Diácono Mariano Preza.

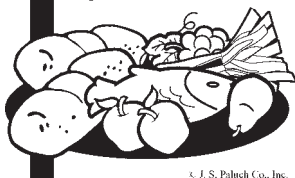
