THOUGHTS FROM FR. RICHARD
 PENSAMIENTOS DE PADRE RICARDO

■ **INAUGURATION DAY, JANUARY 20**

All of us have listened to the past election's social and political comments of many commentators. It has been a most different, and perhaps bizarre pre- and post-election cycle. Not only have the candidates agitated the situation, but it now seems that Russia and its president have as well.

Rhetoric Creates Expectations

As we begin a new administration of the Federal government, the new President has suggested many repeals of laws and has raised many fears among millions of people with regard to minorities, immigrants, healthcare, trade plans, and relationships with other countries. At times, the new president sounds quite reasonable and at other times quite disrespectful – almost like a bully.

While everyone has their own personality, rhetoric and over-simplifying complex issues and realities create sound bites but are very superficial. We will need thoughtful and respectful members of Congress to express reality, multiculturalism, religious pluralism and working together for all Americans and for the common good.

Thoughtlessness Creates Anxiety

Much anxiety and fear has been stirred up, not only before the election but also after. It is easy to retreat into our personal homes and say to ourselves, “well, I am comfortable,” without caring to step into the shoes of many Americans who are barely surviving – either because of healthcare or being undocumented Americans, or other classes of people who are invisible and who live at the edges of poverty or below. To not care about everyone or to remain in ignorance about everyone is not an American virtue.

The Veneer of National Unity

Speaking to the issue of immigration, Archbishop Jose Gomez spoke on the evening after the election about a problem that no republican or democratic administration for the last 30 years has been able to resolve, because there has been no con-

gressional will to do so. And now some hope to build a wall, and deportation will become the solution, unmindful that the hotel, restaurant, landscaping and farming industry would collapse. The immigrant has not stolen jobs that Americans want. What this election has done is to let racism, discrimination, uncaring individualism, and naked application of law erupt into divisions that were always there.

America Is Not a Business

Will a total business approach to American and international life be the key that resolves all our social and societal issues? It is one thing to build a company; it is another to build and re-build a society of people.

We have to pray for President Donald Trump and for all who will lead our Federal government, because we are entering uncharted territory and a whole different way to lead and to govern. I don't believe that we will succeed very well if we do not speak civilly and respectfully to each other.

It is not likely that President Trump will change his personality or his manner of speaking, although I have been encouraged by listening to the reasoned comments of those proposed to help lead the government, who seem to understand the functioning of government and the rules of law. Hopefully, they can become a shield of reasonableness that is willing to work through the complexity of governing for all the people.

Groups Pushing Agendas

There are so many groups, even from within the Catholic Church, who want to reduce freedoms now granted by law because they do not agree with pluralistic views. Where is the middle ground? I hope our new government will seek to define the middle ground. I do not believe that we can go backward, but we do need to find the way to go forward together. Pugnacious rhetoric and close-mindedness will not get us there.

Maybe all of this will bring everyone to a new clarification and redefinition of what is good for society. While there are many people who believe that everyone has

the right to do whatever they believe is right, that is the road to anarchy. Keeping everything the way it was and making life very good for a minority of citizens will also erupt in revolution and anarchy.

What Can We Do?

One person can do very little to move society one way or the other. What can we do together? How do we organize together? Perhaps we need a Department of Mental and Spiritual Health, a Department of the Common Good? That will not provide tax money, however; but it would improve the overall spiritual and mental health of our United States.

Putting Our Prayers on God's Desk

As I wrote a couple of weeks ago, we need to put our prayers on God's desk.

“What kind of country do we want, O God? What kind of hearts do we want our President and his government to have? What do you want?”

“May togetherness, for everyone-ness with reasonableness lead our country forward. You are still in charge and your Holy Spirit knows no walls.”

“We know that money, power, economics and rhetoric is the present noise of our society. We know also that you have no tolerance for broken dreams and broken people.”

“Hear the prayers of your people. Renew our governments and the hearts of all the peoples of this great county. May you help our leaders find solutions of which they have not thought.”

■ **MATTHEW'S GOSPEL AND THE AUTHENTIC FOLLOWER OF JESUS**

We may have been baptized as Catholic, but that does not mean that we are an authentic follower of Jesus. That is Matthew's point in his Gospel. That is why the Epiphany story is more than camels, magi, gold, frankincense and myrrh. Jesus' star draws us to him.

We may have gone to catechism and Catholic school. We may have made our First Holy Communion and Confirmation. But where is that in our lives today?

We may have received the spiritual gifts of Faith, Hope and Love, but where are they today in our lives?

The Gospel writers do not write about how to be a good Catholic, because the Catholic Church never existed then. **What did exist was an awareness of being a follower of Jesus, who gathered people to live a communal life,** to live the Spirit of the risen Jesus, to gather to be there for each other, to gather in prayer to remember Jesus, protecting and helping each other as friends and fellow believers.

Jesus never intended to establish an organized institution with paid or non-paying members. We are not a lodge that makes no real difference to our normal life.

The Gospel of Matthew was written to help the early followers of Jesus who were living in Antioch, Syria to know what was meant to be a follower of Jesus. **That did not come from some theory, but from how people lived and interacted and cared for one another.**

What was the problem? A bit of “class struggle”, financial differences, an upper class of Christians and a lower class, each other not wanting to be together or to help those less fortunate.

At the heart of Matthew’s rendition of the Gospel of Jesus is a simple evangelical principle that **the way we treat one another, most especially “the least of our brothers and sisters”** indicates how authentic we are.

“We are challenged to love as the Lord loves, unconditionally, totally and without reservation for such is the kingdom of heaven.” (Biagio Mazza Celebration P5, January Issue)

Matthew’s Gospel points out the Prayer of the church, “The Our Father,” as precisely making this point. That when we treat one another as equals God forgives our sinfulness, our selfishness and our blindness.

The very last paragraph of the Gospel is the Gospel’s principal theme (28:18-20): “Go therefore, (that is you and me), make

disciples of as many as you can and baptize them... teaching them to observe everything that I have commanded you. And behold I am with you until the end of the age.”

This is the heart of the Gospel. St. Matthew calls us “Scribes instructed in the kingdom of heaven.” This is more than just being “good people.”

For Matthew, there needs to be a living connection to Jesus, to one another, especially to the “least.” To be a follower of Jesus pushes us outward, never to be absorbed in ourselves.

If we never come to celebrate the Eucharist on Sunday and hear Matthew’s Gospel, if we never sit quietly and read his Gospel, where will Jesus have an opportunity to transform us into his authentic followers?

5PM SATURDAY CHOIR LOOKING FOR NEW MEMBERS

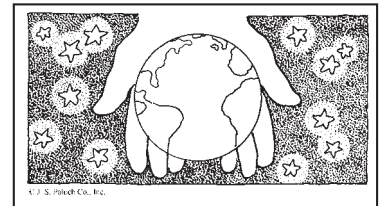
The role of the choir is to assist the assembly in worship by leading them in singing during the Mass.

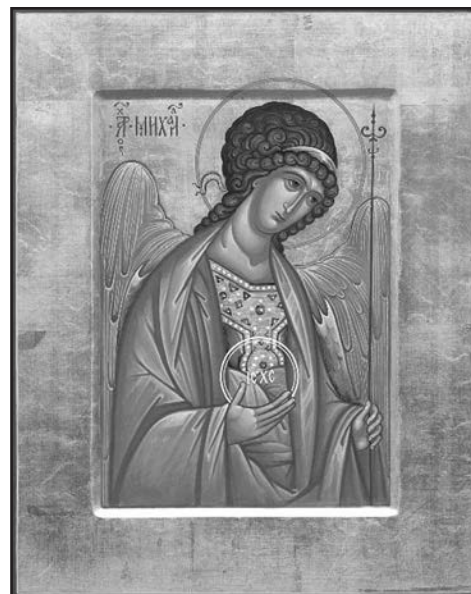

■ DIA DE LA INAUGURACIÓN, 20 DE ENERO

Todos hemos escuchado los últimos comentarios sociales y políticos de muchos comentaristas. Ha sido bastante diferente, y tal vez extraño antes y después del ciclo de la elección. No sólo con los candidatos que agitaron la situación, pero ahora parece ser que Rusia y su Presidente también.

Retórica Crea Expectativas

Así comenzamos una nueva administración del Gobierno Federal, el nuevo Presidente ha sugerido muchas derogaciones de las leyes y ha suscitado muchos temores entre millones de personas en relación con las minorías, inmigrantes, salud, planes de comercio y relaciones con otros países. A veces, el nuevo Presidente suena bastante razonable y otras veces bastante irrespetuoso – casi como un matón

Mientras que cada uno tiene su propia personalidad, teoría, sobre-simplifica los problemas complejos y crea sonidos duros pero todo es muy superficial. Necesitamos reflexivos y respetuosos miembros del Congreso para expresar la realidad, multiculturalismo, pluralismo religioso y trabajar juntos los estadounidenses para el bien común.

Desconcierto Crea Ansiedad

Mucha ansiedad y desconcierto ha sido levantado, no sólo antes de las elecciones, sino también después. Es fácil de encontrarnos en nuestros hogares y decir a nosotros mismos, “así me siento cómodo,” sin tener que ponernos en los zapatos de muchos americanos que apenas sobreviven, ya sea por salud o por americanos indocumentados, u otras clases de personas que son invisibles y que viven en los bordes de la pobreza o peor. El no importar de nadie o el permanecer en la ignorancia acerca de todos no es una virtud estadounidense.

La Apariencia de Unidad Nacional

Hablando del problema de inmigración, Monseñor Jose Gomez hablo en la noche después de la elección sobre un problema que ninguna administración republicana o democrática de los últimos 30 años ha

sido capaz de resolver, porque el Congreso no va a hacerlo. Y ahora algunos tienen la esperanza de construir un muro y la deportación se convertirá en la solución, sin considerar que el hotel, restaurante, los jardines y sector agrícola podrían ser destruidos. El inmigrante no ha robado empleos que los estadounidenses quieren. Lo que ha hecho esta elección es dejar que el racismo, la discriminación, individualismo indiferente y la desnuda aplicación de ley estallara en divisiones que siempre estuvieron ahí.

Estados Unidos No Es Un Negocio

Sera bueno hacer una solución de negocios a la vida americana e internacional para resolver todos nuestros problemas sociales? Una cosa es construir una empresa; otra es construir y reconstruir una sociedad de personas.

Tenemos que orar por el Presidente Donald Trump y por todos los que guíaran nuestro Gobierno Federal porque estamos entrando en territorio desconocido y una manera completamente diferente de dirigir y gobernar. No creo que tenga un buen éxito si no hablamos civilmente y con respeto uno al otro.

No es probable que el Presidente Trump cambiará su personalidad o su manera de hablar aunque he escuchado y me siento muy animado con los razonados comentarios de las propuestas de las personas que ayudaran a llevar el gobierno, que parecen comprender el funcionamiento del gobierno y de las normas de derecho. Tal vez todo esto traerá a todos a una nueva aclaración y redefinición de lo que es bueno para la sociedad. Mientras que

hay muchas personas que creen que toda persona tiene derecho a hacer lo que ellos creen es correcto, que es el camino a la anarquía. Mantener todo como estaba y hacer la vida muy buena para una minoría de ciudadanos también estallará en la revolución y la anarquía.

“Escucha las oraciones de tu pueblo. Renueva nuestros gobiernos y los corazones de todos los pueblos de este gran país. Ayuda a nuestros líderes a encontrar soluciones de lo que no han pensado.”

■ EL EVANGELIO DE MATEO Y EL AUTENTICO SEGUIDOR DE CRISTO

Nosotros podemos haber sido bautizados como católicos pero eso no significa que somos auténticos seguidores de Jesús. Este es el punto de Mateo en su evangelio. Por esta razón la historia de la Epifanía es más que camellos, Reyes Magos, oro, incienso y mirra. La estrella de Jesús nos atrae a él.

Pudimos haber ido a Catecismo y escuela católica. Pudimos haber hecho nuestra Primera Comunión y Confirmación. ¿Pero dónde es que están nuestras vidas hoy?

Pudimos haber recibido los regalos de la Fe, Esperanza y Amor, pero donde están en nuestras vidas hoy?

Los escritores del evangelio no escriben sobre cómo ser un buen católico, porque la Iglesia Católica nunca existió entonces. **Lo que existía era una conciencia de ser un seguidor de Jesús, que reunía a la gente para vivir una vida** en común para vivir el espíritu de Jesús resucitado y estar el uno para el otro, que se reúnen en oración para recordar a Jesús, protegiendo y ayudándose unos a otros como amigos y creyentes.

Jesús nunca intento establecer una organización, o un instituto con miembros pagados o no pagados. No somos un lugar de hospedaje que no hace diferencia en nuestra vida normal.

El Evangelio de Mateo fue escrito para ayudar a los primeros seguidores de Jesús que vivían en Antioquía, Siria para saber lo que significaba ser un seguidor de Jesús. **Que no vino de alguna teoría, sino de cómo la gente vivió y obró recíprocamente y cuidándose el uno al el otro.**

¿Cuál fue el problema? Un poco de “lucha de clases”, las diferencias financieras, una clase superior de cristianos y una clase inferior, unos a otros que no deseaban estar juntos o ayudar a los menos afortunados.

En el corazón de la interpretación del Evangelio de Mateo de Jesús hay un simple principio evangélico la manera del trato de unos a otros, especialmente “los menos favorecidos de nuestros hermanos y hermanas” indica que auténticos somos.

“Estamos desafiados a amar como el Señor ama, incondicionalmente, totalmente y sin reservas para tales es el Reino de los cielos”. (Biagio Mazza celebración P5, edición enero)

El Evangelio de Mateo destaca la oración de la iglesia, “El Padre Nuestro” como haciendo énfasis precisamente en este punto. Que cuando tratamos uno al otro como igual Dios perdona nuestros pecados, nuestro egoísmo y nuestra ceguera.

El último párrafo del Evangelio es el tema del principio del Evangelio (28: 18-20): “ir por lo tanto, (es decir usted y yo) a hacer discípulos a tantos como puedas y bautizarlos... enseñándoles a guardar todo lo que os he mandado. Y he aquí yo estoy con vosotros hasta el final de los años.”

Este es el corazón del Evangelio. San Mateo nos llama “Escribientes instruidos en el Reino de los cielos.” Esto es más que solo ser “buena gente”.

Para Mateo, tiene que haber una conexión viviente a Jesús, unos a otros, especialmente a los “menos”. Ser un seguidor de Jesús nos empuja hacia afuera, nunca para ser absorbidos en nuestros mismos.

¿Si no venimos a celebrar la Eucaristía los domingos y oír el Evangelio de Mateo, si nunca nos sentamos tranquilamente a leer

su evangelio, donde Jesús tendrá la oportunidad de transformarnos en sus auténticos seguidores?
